SB 1 Drainage Improvement Project to Start this Week on State Route 36 in Shasta County

REDDING – The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans District 2) and Roll 'N Rock Construction, Inc. are preparing to begin work on the Platina Liners Project on State Route 36 in Shasta County. The \$345k project, which is funded in part by Senate Bill (SB) 1, will install cast-in-place liners at three culvert locations near Platina, from 1.3 miles west of Deer Lick Springs Road to just west of the Shasta/Tehama County line.

Construction activities are currently planned to start on Wednesday, May 11th. Motorists will encounter one-way traffic control in the area, Mondays – Fridays during daytime hours, with up to 5-minute delays. Motorists are urged to slow down and drive carefully in and around construction areas, follow speed limit reductions in place, and allot extra time for delays. The project is currently anticipated to be completed by the end of May, pending weather and operations.

Construction projects are subject to changes without prior notice. Caltrans and its contractors do our best to keep the public informed. SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually split between the state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects that are partially funded by SB 1. Through Senate Bill 1, Caltrans has committed to repair or replace 17,000 miles of pavement, 7,700 traffic signals, signs, and sensors, 55,000 culverts and drains, and 500 bridges by 2027.

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
